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ABOUT INTERNATIONAL CEREMONIES

International No Stone Left Alone ceremonies vary significantly, especially from domestic ceremonies. Many International ceremonies are carried out without school groups or a large public presence, whether you reside outside of Canada or are travelling abroad. We will be happy to work with you to tailor your ceremony to your specific needs and situation; The act of Remembrance, whether it be the placing of one poppy or thousands, is incredibly important, and we hope you will join us in honouring Canadians across the globe.

At International ceremonies, No Stone Left Alone representatives will rarely be present; thus, your ceremony will be organized and carried out by the organizer, with the remote support of No Stone Left Alone staff.

CEREMONY STARTUP CHECKLIST

☐ Choose your cemetery

You can locate cemeteries in your desired area using our <u>Find a Cemetery Map</u> (www.nostoneleftalone.ca/find-a-cemetery)

☐ Ensure the number of Canadian Veterans in the chosen cemetery is attainable for your group to honour all headstones present.

This number can be acquired by contacting the International Coordinator with the name of the cemetery.

Alternatively, you can use <u>Commonwealth</u> <u>War Graves Commission's search tool</u> to find this number. Filter using these two fields before you search:

"Served with country" - CANADIAN

"Cemetery of Memorial" (under additional fields) - [INSERT CEMETERY NAME]

PRE-CEREMONY CHECKLIST

With a site selected, it is time to get everything together for your ceremony.

■ Source poppies for your ceremony

We encourage you to create your own poppies and where possible involve youth at this step, especially should you not plan on haiving youth present at your ceremony.

■ Some concepts for creating your own poppies can be found HERE. If you are unable to create your own poppies, you can obtain poppies from your local Legion branch. (Note - prior to placing these poppies you must remove the pins - the black centres can be reattached with glue or adhesive afterwards)

If you reside outside of Canada or do not have access to a local Legion branch, please consider creating your own poppies or contact the International Coordinator to arrange a delivery of poppies to you. You will be responsible for the transportation of the poppies to the ceremony site itself.

OPTIONAL

Source a wreath for your ceremony - You can either create your own wreath or purchase a wreath to be brought to the ceremony should you choose to do so. We again encourage the engaging of youth at this step if possible. Ideas can be found HERE.

No Stone Left Alone will supply a wreath ribbon for your wreath at no cost, however the wreath itself remains the responsibility of the organizer.

If your situation or travel plans prevent the inclusion of a wreath, this step can be omitted.



■ Plan readings

Ensure you have all of the required readings for your ceremony prepared in advance, either in digital or printed form. These can be found HERE.

□ Prepare Music

If you are performing music live by vocals or instruments, ensure equipment and sheet music is adequately prepared. Otherwise, we encourage the use of mobile devices and/or small wireless speakers to play music aloud. You can download music HERE.

■ Scout out your cemetery

Determine a suitable location within the cemetery to host your ceremony.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) cemeteries will nearly always have a Cross of Sacrifice or similar cenotaph where a ceremony can be performed. For civic cemeteries, especially in cases with few and/ or scattered Veterans' headstones, it may be necessary to simply find an open area for the ceremony or hold it in front of the Veterans' headstone(s).

We suggest the use of satellite imagery (Google Earth, Google Maps, etc.) or online cemetery maps for this step. For additional assistance at this stage, contact the International Coordinator.

□ Organize photography and video

Ensure someone present at your ceremony can take photos and video throughout the ceremony.

□ OPTIONAL - Prepare flags

For use in your ceremony and photography, we encourage the use of both the Canadian flag and the flag of the nation in which your ceremony takes place. If you require any flags, please contact the International Coordinator, who will either provide you with printable versions or full flags (time and resources permitting).



□ OPTIONAL - Invite Guests

If you have local connections, please feel free to reach out and invite them to your ceremony. Ensure any noteworthy changes in attendance are noted to the International Coordinator.

☐ OPTIONAL - Letter of Purpose

If you are travelling internationally and carrying large quantities of materials for your No Stone Left Alone ceremony, the International Coordinator is able to provide you with a signed document to explain the purpose of said materials to relevant customs and border officials should they inquire.

□ OPTIONAL - Print information sheets for distribution

Please feel free to print out additional resources from the supplemental resources section of this package to distribute to anyone who may be interested in your ceremony or the No Stone Left Alone cause.

CEREMONY SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

- O Canada is sung or played.
- National Anthem of Host Nation is sung or played.
- 3. In Flanders Fields is read.
- 4. OPTIONAL: Prayer of Remembrance is read.
- 5. Commitment to Remember is read.
- OPTIONAL: Act of Remembrance is read by a soldier, cadet or a legion member (if present).
- 7. Last Post is played.
- Two minutes of silence will be observed by all.NO photos are to be taken by anyone during this time.
- OPTIONAL: Lament (Flowers of the Forest) is played.
- 10. Rouse (Reveille) is played.
- 11. OPTIONAL: Wreath is placed at the cenotaph. If there is no cenotaph present at the cemetery, the wreath can be placed at a location agreed upon by the ceremony organizers prior to the ceremony.
- 12. Participants spread out as needed to place poppies at military headstones. Refer to Poppy Placement Protocol enclosed at the back of this document.

NOTE: Any optional elements are to be included at the discretion of the ceremony organizer, depending on time, availability, resources, and personnel present



IMPORTANT - Please note the NSLA guidelines for honouring headstones:

- Please use pinless Legion poppies or handmade poppy alternatives only. (see Poppy Alternatives activity)
- Never apply poppies or stickers to headstones with any kind of adhesive.
- Do not use other commemorative items such as flags in place of the poppy. (You may use small Canadian flags to pre-mark the location of headstones.)
- Additional gestures such as pouring alcohol on the grave are not permitted.

POPPY PLACEMENT PROTOCOL

1. IDENTIFY

At the cemetery you are assigned to there may be two main types of military headstones that you are looking for; the upright military headstone and the flat military headstone.





You may also happen to find a regular headstone with a military designation which you may also place a poppy at. In some cases, military headstones will be pre-marked with a Canadian flag or other marker.



2. PLACE


Once you have identified a headstone, kneel towards the headstone. Please recite out loud the veteran's name and gently place the poppy at the base of the headstone.



3. REFLECT

After laying the poppy, please stand upright and take a moment to reflect on the veteran's service and sacrifice given so freely to Canada.





OUR ROOTS

In 1971, a child of twelve sat at her dying mother's bedside. Her mother, a veteran, asked her not to cry and to try not to forget her on Armistice Day.

Never missing a year since her mother's passing, Maureen Bianchini Purvis visited the gravesite to lay a poppy each Remembrance Day. As her own family grew and joined in her remembrance, her daughters began to ask, "Why don't the others receive a poppy?"

With the help of a few friends, she began building upon this vision. In 2011, No Stone Left Alone was born, with the goal of honouring all of Canada's veterans, and changing the way the next generation remembers.

NO STONE LEFT ALONE

Painted Poppy Stones

YOU WILL NEED:

- smooth stones
- black, red, white (acrylic craft paint)
- assorted sized paint brushes (use a small fine liner brush for writing)
- acrylic craft sealer/varnish

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Wash the stones with water (and a bit of dish soap if necessary) to remove dirt/grit. Set them in the sunshine or dry them with a towel. Either way, they'll dry very quickly.
- 2. Have your students paint the stones black, red or white and let them dry.
 - **(TIP)** It's easier to just paint the tops and sides of the stones for now. Leave the bottoms until the tops are finished, varnished and dry.
- 3. Paint a red circle on the front of the rock, leaving enough space underneath for some writing.
- 4. Now have them paint a black circle in the center of the poppy.
 - Once dry, add a white dot by dipping the end of a paint brush in white paint and touching it to the center of the black circle.
- 5. Thin some white paint with a bit of water. (You can do this by wetting the brush, dipping it into the paint and working it into the brush a little. Write a message across the blank area of the stone.
- 6. Leave to dry completely.
- 7. Once the paint is dry, brush with a coat of craft varnish or sealer. This will add sheen to the rocks and really make the paint colours pop. It will also help make the paint weatherproof.
- 8. Allow to dry for a few hours.
- 9. When the varnish on top of the stone is fully dry and no longer tacky, paint and varnish the bottom of the stone.







Painted Coffee Filter Poppies

YOU WILL NEED:

- paper coffee filters (at least 2 per poppy)
- red paint (assorted shades optional)
- paint brushes
- black button
- green button
- glue
- hair dryer (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Have your students paint their coffee filters, completely covering one side of the filter with red paint. Encourage trying to blend a few shades of red on each filter, or to paint each filter a different shade of red to show variety.
- 2. The next step is letting the coffee filters dry for a few hours, or with a hair dryer. The coffee filters will be quite flimsy when wet, so use caution if you choose to dry them with a hair dryer.
- 3. Next, have your students crumple the dry, painted coffee filters into tight, little balls. They'll love this part!
- 4. Now, uncrumple them, so they're somewhat smooth, but still wrinkly.
- 5. Layer 2 or 3 coffee filters loosely together and pinch the centre-back of the filters together, giving a little twist to hold bind them together.
- 6. Glue a black button onto the front of each poppy, and top with a smaller green button.
- 7. Let dry fully, and then give your poppies a little fluffing up if needed.

Egg Carton Poppies

WAYS TO USE EGG CARTON POPPIES - attach stems and display in a vase, glue to a painted canvas, decorate paper plate or cardboard wreath

YOU WILL NEED:

- egg carton
- paint red and black
- paint brush
- scissors
- tissue paper green, yellow or white
- glue
- drinking straws (or painted popsicle sticks or chopsticks) if making stems

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Have your students cut the egg carton into sections and trim off any points or uneven bits to round each section out.
- 2. Cut 3 or 4 "V's" into each section, from the edge to the bottom, to form the petals of the poppies.
- 3. Turn sections upside down and gently press down on them to spread the petals out.
- 4. Have your students paint the poppies red. Here only the front of the poppies are painted. Feel free to paint the backs as well.
- 5. Paint the center of the poppies black.
- 6. Cut tissue paper into 2 inch squares, and crumple into small balls. Have your students roll them the between the palms of their hands to make them nice and tight.
- 7. Add a drop of glue to the center of each poppy and press the tissue paper balls into place.
- 8. If you're adding stems to the poppies, glue the back of each poppy to a green drinking straw or a painted chopstick.

Paper Plate Poppies


YOU WILL NEED:

- paper plates
- red paint (assorted shades optional)
- black paint
- paintbrushes
- wine cork (optional)
- scissors

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Have your students each take a paper plate and paint one side red.
- 2. When your students are happy with the look of their red plate, have them add a black centre to their poppy. The black center can either be painted on with a paint brush or stamped on with a wine cork dipped in black paint.
- 3. Leave the poppy plates to dry for a few hours.
- 4. When the paint is dry to the touch, have your students make 4 V-shaped cuts into the rim of the paper plate to form the petals of the flower.

Egg carton poppy wreath

YOU WILL NEED:

- Large paper plate or cardboard
- Paintbrushes
- Black sharpie (optional)
- · Red, black, green, paint
- Scissors
- Glue (or hot glue gun)
- Egg carton

INSTRUCTIONS:

- Trace a small circle in the middle of the plate or cardboard
- 2. Use a larger circle to trace the shape of the wreath on the cardboard.
- 3. With a craft knife, cut along the traced lines to create the form of a wreath
- 4. Have your students paint the wreath base green and let it dry completely.
- 5. Cut individual cups out of the egg carton.
- 6. Then, trim away any excess bits of the carton to create a flower from each egg holder. Cut the corners from top to bottom then trim the tops of the egg holders to create the petals.
- 7. (Optional)- Gently pull the egg holder sides apart to create an open flower.
- 8. Use the extra pieces from the egg carton to create leaves.
- 9. Have your students paint each egg holder red and the leaves green. Leave the bottoms unpainted. Let dry fully.
- 10. Now paint the middle of the egg carton flowers black.
- 11. Glue or hot glue on the poppy flowers to the wreath one at a time leaving minimal space between them.
- 12. Glue the leaves on the wreath to help fill in any gaps.
- 13. Now write your school/groups name in the middle.
- 14. (Optional) Glue a piece of string in a loop to the top, back part of the wreath to act as the wreath hanger.

Making a Styrofoam wreath

You will need:

- Styrofoam wreath
- Poppies/embellishments
- Pins (optional)
- Hot glue gun (optional)

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Spray-paint the foam wreath green or cover with fabric.
- 2. Have your students glue poppies to the wreath, or with the help of an adult use straight pins to adhere poppies/embellishments (as shown here
 - with crystal pieces) by pressing a pin through the embellishment into the soft base beneath.
- 3. Repeat, placing poppies/embellishments as close together as you can and using smaller ones on top to fill in gaps.
- 4. (Optional) Glue a piece of string in a loop to the top, back part of the wreath to act as the wreath hanger.



While each NSLA event is unique, they share some common themes which we hope to capture - allowing us to see and to share the moving story of your commemoration. Please consider prioritizing these types of images from your event, where applicable.

Arrivals. Youth arriving on buses, or walking into the cemetery together.
