in their honour, and the cemetery would resemble the idea of Flanders Fields where the poppies grow "row on row."

The No Stone Left Alone Memorial Foundation has taken part in numerous ceremonies across Canada and extended to Poland since its inception. In 2019: 12,297 students from 127 schools placed 64,503 poppies in 121 cemeteries on their graves.

The Foundation's mission is to honour Canada's military's sacrifice and service by educating students and placing poppies on the headstones of veterans every November.

Usually, the local service is a combined effort of the Greenwood Cemetery Board, Ridgetown Br. 243 Legion, Ridgetown Kiwanis Club and the Ridgetown Key Club and open to the public.

Jim Brown, the organizer of the local event, hope to see everyone back next year. "While smaller and a slightly different program, the importance of the event is the same," stated Brown. With attendance limited, we expanded the laying of poppies on Veterans graves outside of the Legion Plot and throughout the cemetery, which we always hoped to do. Taking part in this year's service where Members of Br. 243 Ridgetown Legion executive, Br. 243 Legion Padre, Rev. Al McIntyre and invited students, Rain Crow and Olive Crow.



A year has passed since we last gathered in our communities to honour our important military Veterans. We are all very aware today of the difference a year can make. Our world is constantly changing, and we are all


