Maureen Bianchini Purvis is a proud Canadian/Metis citizen and Founder, President and Chair of No Stone Left Alone.

Born and raised in Edmonton, Alberta she experienced a devastating loss at a young age, the death of her mother who had served in WWII. Years passed and after visiting the cemetery every November 11th where her mother was buried, she became more aware of the number of military headstones in the Field of Honour that surrounded her. It was a powerful image. She was very concerned as the years went by that the message of our military past was being lost on a young generation. She admitted

to her herself that she knew very little about their service. Out of this concern and using her years administrative skills, No Stone Left Alone began in 2011 with a small group of volunteers placing poppies at one cemetery. Since then it has turned into a national movement during Remembrance week engaging young students and like-minded Canadians, from coast to coast to coast.

"I have the obligation to ensure that No Stone Left Alone reaches its highest potential, to reach each headstone in Canada. The program has become one of the most recognizable and important activities during Remembrance week. Done by 99% loyal volunteers whom we are so grateful for, it shows the power of the simple act, that resonates in the hearts of so many.
